Established in 2001 as an imprint of the training in child and adolescent psychotherapy at the British Association of Psychotherapists (now IPCAPA at the BPF), the 'Indies' Series' has seen the publication of four important additions to the literature on theory and practice in the Independent tradition. Five further titles are in mind of which three are in development.

Following our successful collaboration over *The Handbook of Child and Adolescent Psychotherapy* (our editors at Routledge had approached us to undertake this as we were then respectively current and recent editors of the *Journal of Child Psychotherapy*), I approached Monica Lanyado to see if that collaboration might extend to a book series. I hoped to begin a series that would make available current Independent thinking and practice, especially our approach to technique, to encourage graduates of our training to write and be published and to establish a marque for what was recognised as a very good and relevant training. It seemed important and possible, 19 years after its establishment, to take the training to this new stage.

There was also a fourth, personal, intention – I wanted very much to thank our grandmothers and grandfathers for establishing such a stimulating training in psychoanalytic child and adolescent psychotherapy: this series would also be a present for them. In Winnicott's *Children* ten of the chapters are written by graduates of the BAP/IPCAPA training while the others are written by IPCAPA members/supervisors and training analyst- surely an indication of how much our trainees have taken in and incorporated over time. We look forward to our graduates now editing their own volumes and more recent ones beginning to write for the series!
